



POWERING TOGETHER: HOW YOUR MEMBERSHIP PAYS OFF

iverland Energy Cooperative members experience growing financial benefits the longer they remain part of the cooperative. Our capital credit program, approved by the board of directors, lets members invest in the co-op's infrastructure. This is done by allocating funds to members and eventually paying them out, known as retiring capital credits. It's a rewarding way for members to be part of the cooperative's journey.

Capital credits are a key advantage of being a co-op member. Unlike investor-owned utilities, Riverland Energy

provides a service at cost, meaning Riverland doesn't generate profits. Instead, any funds after covering expenses, referred to as margins, is allocated back to members in the form of capital credits. These credits represent the investment and support of every member in the cooperative, unlike dividends from investor-owned utilities, which go to shareholders who may not even use the utility's services.

At this time of year, eligible Riverland Energy members receive a portion of the cooperative's margins based on their energy payments from the previous year.

Economic participation by members is one of our seven cooperative principles that sets energy co-ops apart from investor-owned and municipal utilities. As a Riverland Energy member, your capital credits represent your share in the cooperative. You can view your capital credit amount on your October billing statement. (3G08A0002)

REC keeps track of how much electricity you use and pay for throughout the year.



REC reviews annual revenue against operational costs, to determine positive margins.



If financial conditions allow, **REC** assigns positive margins as capital credits, based on each member's yearly electricity payments.



The board of directors will approve to retire (pay) capital credits to members.



For eligible members, REC will issue your capital credit retirement as a check or bill credit.


SPOT YOUR SERVICE LOCATION NUMBER

If you've ever cruised along State Road 54/35 near Centerville and spotted a roadside stand bursting with flowers, produce, and personality, you've likely stumbled upon Schwertel Family Farms, a local gem with deep roots and a big heart.

Founded in the 1950s by Mildred Schwertel, the farm has grown through three generations of hard work, innovation, and community spirit. Today, Ryan and Kristina Schwertel carry on that legacy, having purchased the farm in 2014 and transformed it into a vibrant destination for locals and visitors alike.

In 2018, the Schwertels made a bold shift, selling their beef cattle and building greenhouses. Fast forward to today, they've got four greenhouses overflowing with blooms, vegetables, and seasonal charm. Their roadside stand offers fresh produce, beautiful flowers, and family-friendly activities that make it more than just a stop, it's an experience.

Each spring, the farm kicks off its season with the beloved "Mother's Day Shindig," featuring hanging baskets, perennials, grab-and-go arrangements, live music, local vendors, and their newly opened beer garden. Coming up on September 6, 2025, is the "End of Summer Bash," a festive launch into fall with hayrides, a nine-acre corn maze,

pumpkin patch, animals to visit, and the beginning of mum season. Schwertel's sells around 4,000 mums each year, and they're a sight to behold. (8G23C0261)

Beyond the stand, the Schwertel family is deeply woven into the community. They've provided all the sweet corn sold at Trempealeau Catfish Days, donated corn to the Galesville





Lions Club for the Trempealeau County Fair and are proud supporters of the Gale-Ettrick-Trempealeau School District.

When I visited in late July, the stand was buzzing with activity, even in the middle of the day. Customers stopped in for produce, and I heard stories of visitors from Texas and Alaska who made sure to bring Schwertel-grown goodies home with them. One fun fact: everyone working on the farm

is family. When I asked Ryan how many employees they had, he smiled and said, "We're all family. That's the beauty of being third generation—there's always someone around."

Whether you're grabbing sweet corn, wandering the corn maze, or simply soaking in the charm, Schwertel Family Farms is proof that tradition, community, and a whole lot of love can grow something truly special.





FARM SAFETY

POWER LINE AWARENESS

Make sure EVERYONE is trained on safe practices around electricity. Utilize these safety tips for you, your employees, seasonal workers, family members, and anyone else accessing your farm.

- Keep equipment at least 10 feet from lines at all times, in all directions.
- Know all power line locations on your farm and routes between fields.
- Always use a spotter when moving equipment near power lines.
- Don't completely rely on autosteer or GPS to detect and clear power lines or poles.
- Never attempt to move a power line out of the way or raise it for clearance.
- If a power line is sagging or low, contact us.

If your equipment does hit a power line, pole, or guy wire, do not leave the cab. Immediately call 9-1-1, warn others to stay away, and wait for the utility crew to cut the power.
